

Am I Falling Back or What?!

Despite many Americans' aversion to having to "spring forward" and "fall back" each year, all signs point to continued twice-yearly clock changes. No major legislative changes to daylight saving time (DST) have been enacted yet in 2023, so clocks will fall back on Sunday, Nov.5th.

WASHINGTON, March 15 (Reuters) - The U.S. Senate on Tuesday passed legislation that would make daylight saving time permanent starting in 2023, ending the twice-annual changing of clocks in a move promoted by supporters advocating brighter afternoons and more economic activity. The Senate approved the measure, called the Sunshine Protection Act, unanimously by voice vote. The House of Representatives, which has held a committee hearing on the matter, must still pass the bill before it can go to the President to sign.

Turn your clocks back when you go to bed Saturday, November 4th so you don't get to church an hour early.

Thank You for Serving



World War I – known at the time as "The Great War" – officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour

of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of "the war to end all wars."

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day with the following words: "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations..." An Act (52 Stat. 351; 5 U. S. Code, Sec. 87a) approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday—a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor Veterans of World War I, In 1954, after World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, sailors, Marines and airmen in the Nation's history; after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, the 83rd Congress, at the urging of the Veterans service organizations, amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation (Public Law 380) on June 1, 1954, November 11th became a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

June 28th, 1968, The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for

Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day, and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates. The first Veterans Day under the new "Monday" law was observed with much confusion on October 25, 1971. It was quite apparent that the commemoration of this day was a matter of historic and patriotic significance to a great number of our citizens, and so on September 20th, 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed Public Law 94-97 (89 Stat. 479), which returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date of November 11, beginning in 1978. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veterans service organizations and the American people. Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls: a celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

The annual pilgrimage* to the main evert unfolds thusly:




BEFORE



Educational Stuff

Ever wonder how our organ makes so many different sounds? Different types of pipes are used to generate different types of sounds. In our organ,

the most powerful pipes are called reeds. Just like a clarinet, it has a vibrating tongue, except it is metal and no spit is involved (hopefully). Our longest, and therefore lowest pitch, reed pipe is equivalent to about 16 feet long. As that group of pipes, called a



rank, goes higher in pitch the pipes get smaller. We have 2 ranks of reeds, a Trumpet and an Oboe. Reed pipes can be mitered like an orchestral trumpet. To the left you can see the bottoms of some reed pipes that are mitered. This technique also reduces ceiling height requirements. Reed

pipe resonators are typically made of a tin & lead alloy, zinc, or even wood. There are MANY variations in size and shape.

String pipes - typically have a keener, crisper sound and can often be the source of the very warm sound of an organ. These pipes are typically narrow. For example, look at a pipe that is 8 foot long and 6" in diameter and a pipe that is 8 foot long and only 3" in diameter. They both would produce the same pitch, but the timbres (sound characteristics) would be vastly dif-



ferent. A rank of string pipes may often have a partner rank that is intentionally made out of tune! The result is an even warmer, more lush sound. Pictured here are many ranks of strings. This is PART of the string division of the Wanamaker organ. This organ has 28,750 pipes. It is large, but not the largest that would be the Atlantic City organ with 32,967. On our organ, the

large pipes in the façade are string pipes from a rank called a 16' Violone.

Flutes are another tonal family of organ pipes. These are often pipes that have a complete or partial lid on the top. Flutes are often made of wood, but also the tin & lead alloy and zinc. Shown here is part of a rank of pipes with a complete lids on them. These are called stopped pipes...the lids are called stoppers. The highest pitches





To the left are flute pipes with partial lids. (shown packed for storage) This type of pipe is called a Rorhflute and sometimes called a Chimney Flute. The "lid" is called a cap. We have a rank of these in our organ.

There is record of a primitive organ with pipes that dates to the 3rd century BC, and the oldest playable organ was built in 1435 and still has 12 original pipes. So there are millennia of organ pipe making history and therefore hundreds of types of pipes.
